


Did you wish the story had a sequel or a different ending? Continue the story and use the space below to write or draw what happens next.



the Illustrator**




Illustrations

Illustrations are visual images that help readers better understand the text. Pictures and words work together in a number of ways. They help the audience to visualize, or create mental pictures of the story's setting, characters, and plot.

Style, Medium and Materials

The word **style** describes the way an artist or writer portrays his or her subject matter. It also describes how the artist or writer expresses his or her vision.

A **medium** refers to the materials used by an artist to create an artwork. Some illustrators use more than one medium or media to create an illustration.
